My 1955 Bel Air Chevrolet by Bob Strunk

My first car in high school in the 60's was a 1955 Chevy two door sedan. I only had it a brief time as the engine gave out and I had to junk it. After a time, I found a



1955 four-door Chevy that was in good condition, so I bought it. I drove my 55 faithfully to school and work until I entered the Army in 1969.



During my time in the Army stationed in Alaska, my '55 Chevy' remained at home. Consequently, I purchased a 1957 Chevrolet for personal transportation and to chauffeur my fellow Army buddies around Alaska. After being discharged from the



Army I sold my 57 but kept my 55. Now that I was home, I wanted a new car, so I purchased a 1971 Chevrolet Chevelle SS.



It is evident that I hold a strong preference for Chevrolet vehicles.

As the years rolled on, I continued to drive both my Chevy's.

In September 1973, my father told me about a coworker who was selling a 283engine. At the time, I considered replacing my 265-engine in my 55 with this engine, so I expressed interest in the offer. Subsequently, I purchased the engine for \$40, and the seller provided an option to acquire a junked 1955 Chevrolet for an additional \$5. Upon inspection of the vehicle behind his house, I was surprised to find it was a Bel Air hardtop, which was something I had always desired. Despite its poor condition, I decided to proceed with the purchase. The seller included the power glide transmission as part of the deal.

Having recently married in June; I lacked adequate storage space for an additional vehicle. My father generously offered to store it at his residence. After transporting (CONTINUED)

the vehicle home, I conducted a thorough inspection and discovered that the car's body was remarkably solid. I then decided to install the engine and transmission to make it operable.

Acquiring the 1955 Chevrolet Bel Air hardtop presented both challenges and opportunities. The vehicle was more than just another car; it represented a project with significant potential for development. Eventually, I sold my 55 Chevy four-door and kept the 55 Bel Air hardtop, which served as my dependable work vehicle for many years. Of course, I still had my 71 Chevelle as well.

Throughout the 70's and 80's I undertook the task of refurbishing the 55 and began participating in car shows.

Initially, I turned it into a Hot Rod, modifying the engine and painting it a variety of times over the years before restoring it to its original condition.













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When I started the next restoration in the late 80's, I put in a 265 engine, kept the power glide transmission, and installed an original interior.



Because I now had it back to its original condition, I was able to attend the annual Hershey Car show and once received a 2nd Junior award. Also, as an original I could display my 55 at Das Awkscht Fescht.

As the world entered the 21st century, I embarked on the restoration of my 55, transforming it into a Resto Mod. The project involved installing a 350 engine, upgrading the





transmission to a four-speed, and completing the final paintwork in medium blue and pearl white, thereby maintaining the original blue and white aesthetic.



After completing this project, I took part in various national events in states including Kentucky, North Carolina, Pennsylvania, Vermont, New Jersey, and Delaware, as well as hundreds of local shows. My 55 received multiple awards at both national and local levels.

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In 2013, I had the remarkable opportunity to participate in the Dunkin' Donuts Thanksgiving Day Parade, which took place in front of the notable Philadelphia Art Museum. My vehicle was prominently displayed as a dance troupe performed a routine inspired by "Grease" in its vicinity.

Throughout the years, the car transitioned from being merely a mode of transportation or a project to becoming a treasured artifact of my personal history. It encapsulated memories of extensive journeys, meticulous maintenance sessions in the garage, and numerous discussions with fellow car enthusiasts at car events. The transformation of the 1955 Bel Air paralleled my life journey, continually evolving while preserving its essence. Today, as I observe the polished chrome, the meticulously restored interior, and the craftsmanship evident in every detail, I acknowledge that it is more than just an automobile—it stands as a testament to passion, perseverance, and the enduring narratives that enrich life.

In summary, my journey commenced 52 years ago with a modest investment of \$45.00 in my 1955 Chevrolet Bel Air Hardtop.

AMERICA ON WHEELS - BATTLE OF THE CAR CLUBS by Tom Wright

Over a year ago I was asked, as the current president of the Keystone Chapter of POCI, to consider participating in a new venture at the museum in Allentown, PA, known as America On Wheels.

I met a gentleman a few years ago at one of the chapter's car shows. He said he enjoyed attending our shows, and he wanted to discuss a contest of sorts between our Pontiac Club and three other car clubs. I said we would be interested in hearing more details. He said he would be in touch with me with additional information. He also went on to mention that he was still working out the details of the "contest" and selling it to the museum.

Rich Greene turned out to be the museum's representative and is now a good friend. In the summer of 2024 at GM on Display, Rich said they worked out all the details and were ready to move forward. He shared the details with me and asked if we would be ready to go in October. The contest would consist of 4 clubs--Keystone Chapter, Thunderbird Club, Mopar's, and finally the Wheels of Time Hotrod Club.



Each club would be given a space for three cars of their choice and a display theme developed by each clubs' imagination. The visitors to the museum would be given a ballot as well as club information and then they would vote on their favorite exhibit. At the end of the exhibit (October 15th through April 15th 2025) a count of votes would decide the club winner.

I then proceeded to pick three vehicles from our club members. The owners were asked to give

up their cars for six months, but free storage for the winter months in a warm facility made it easy to get a strong willingness to particpate....who doesn't like free storage?

The three participants agreed on our theme-- The History of Pontiac.

The history is hard to explain with only three cars, but I think we did pretty good with Jim & Elka Martin's 1926 Pontiac (more on Jim's car in a future newsletter) which was the first Pontiac model year. Tim & Karen Britton entered their 1959 Bonneville introducing iconic first year "Wide Track" and "Tri-Power".





Finally, my own 2004-05 Bonneville, which ended 48 years of Bonneville production and some believe started the demise of our beloved Pontiac.

We peppered the display with a few historic posters supplied from the collection of our own club member Bill McIntosh, highlighting Pontiac's World War II participation. Again, hard to put 80 years of history into three examples.

At the end of the six months, the participants were invited to a luncheon at the museum in thanks for their contribution and participation and to present the fan favorite winner as judged by museum visitors' votes. Unfortunately, the Pontiac display was not the winner. That honor went to the Thunderbird Club who had three classic examples of the highly popular T-birds. Well deserved a fine exhibit.

Our club, Keystone State, did very well, but more importantly we got some great visibility for our chapter, met some other car collector clubs, and very importantly started a long time relationship and friendship with the museum America on Wheels.

I think the three of us who participated, along with so many of our club members that attended the exhibit, felt it was an experience no one would ever forget. Enjoy the pictures of the exhibit and a certificate from the museum thanking Keystone for participating in the inaugural event "Battle of the Car Clubs."
